

Japanese scientists attempt Jurassic world test on extinct mammoth





The Great British Spring Clean



This spring, Keep Britain Tidy is organising the biggest ever national clean-up campaign and Hounslow Council, along with its contracted partners, Hounslow Highways and Lampton 360, is lending the campaign its full support and all are busy organising local clean-up events as part of this great campaign. Not only does it make for a more pleasant environment, it can also give an area a real boost and act as a deterrent to people mindlessly throwing their litter on the ground. Rights Respecting


Article 2 - All children have these rights, no matter who they are, where they live, what their parents do, what language they speak, what their religion is, whether they are a boy or girl, what their culture is, whether they have a disability, whether they are rich or poor. No child should be treated unfairly on any basis.

Article 30 - You have the right to practice your own culture, language and religion - or any you choose. Minority and indigenous groups need special protection of this right

Article 29 -Your EDUCATION should help you use and develop your talents and abilities.





We should know :

- These rights apply to everybody under the age of 18.
- These rights are universal. This means they apply to all children, no matter where they live, what their religion is, if you they have a disability or not, or if they are a boy or a girl.
- These rights are unconditional. This means there is nothing you can do to have your rights taken away from you. A child can make a mistake but must still have access to their rights.

- Are there any children around the world who are not able to enjoy this right?
- What can we do to help?
