
Mother's Day



Year 3 Volcanoes Workshop



Hounslow residents help fight food waste



In Hounslow, the campaign's main event is a food festival called 'Food for Thought', taking place on Turnham Green, Chiswick on Saturday 30 March from 11am to 4pm. The event billed as a celebration of the value of food, will see a whole host of food and educational stalls, with talks and cooking demonstrations. There will be lots of tasting and freebies, so come along for a great FREE event and you're bound to pick up some good tips too! The EU-funded Transforming City Food Habits for Life project, (TRiFOCAL) run by the London Waste and Recycling Board (LWARB), WRAP and environmental regeneration charity Groundwork London, is in the process of rolling out localised campaigns across eight London boroughs; Bexley, Hackney, Hounslow, Islington, Lambeth, Merton, Sutton and Tower Hamlets. Altogether, the initiative is expected to reach over 2.3 million people, over a quarter of London's total population, before rolling out to the other 24 London boroughs at a later date. WRAP statistics show that over eight million tonnes of food is consumed in London per year, and with the city's population of 8.7 million residents projected to rise to over 10 million within 20 years, more than a million tonnes is added to consumption every year. Moreover, London households throw away an estimated 910,000 tonnes of food each year.

Rights Respecting


Article 2 - All children have these rights, no matter who they are, where they live, what their parents do, what language they speak, what their religion is, whether they are a boy or girl, what their culture is, whether they have a disability, whether they are rich or poor. No child should be treated unfairly on any basis.

Article 30 - You have the right to practice your own culture, language and religion - or any you choose. Minority and indigenous groups need special protection of this right

Article 29 -Your EDUCATION should help you use and develop your talents and abilities.





We should know :

- These rights apply to everybody under the age of 18.
- These rights are universal. This means they apply to all children, no matter where they live, what their religion is, if you they have a disability or not, or if they are a boy or a girl.
- These rights are unconditional. This means there is nothing you can do to have your rights taken away from you. A child can make a mistake but must still have access to their rights.
